The history of Alaska dates back to around 14,000 BC, when Asiatic groups crossed the Bering land bridge (1580 AD) into what is now western Alaska. The Native Tribes may have been a part of the Xiongnu Empire who inhabited the eastern Asian Steppe, a tribal confederation of fierce warriors who fought on horseback. The Xiongnu dominated a vast part of Central Asia for over 500 years, covering large swaths of present-day Siberia and Mongolia.

They lived peacefully in Alaska until the arrival of the Russians in 1770's and then by the Spanish & British, each one introducing their languages, religions & cultures forcing the natives to surrender and adopt. In addition, they fought for dominance, colonizing & killing hundreds and thousands of the natives. The Europeans also brought diseases for which the natives were not immune to, and which killed thousands more.

On March 30, 1867, Seward and Russian envoy Baron Edouard de Stoeckl signed the Treaty of Cession, which gave the entire Alaskan territory over to the United States for \$7.2 million, or roughly 2 cents an acre.

Life got much better for the Natives after March 30, 1867 when U.S. purchased Alaska from Russia for \$7.2 million (about 2 cents per acre), and with the discovery of Gold in 1896, which brought many other settlers and more than \$1 billion to the economy. In 1957, with the discovery of oil further added a fortune to Alaskan economy. Today, Alaska is one of the richest states in America, with prosperous fishing & tourism industries and an even more prosperous petroleum industry

Alaska is increasingly becoming a multicultural state, attracting thousands of highly skilled professionals from around the world, bringing foreign cultures from Africa, Asia, Europe, the Middle East, Latin America and the Pacific Islands.

From adventure, arts, culture, breathtaking sightseeing to wildlife, tourism in Alaska is the second-largest private sector employer, accounting for one in eight Alaskan jobs, nearly 2 million visitors, and \$2.42 billion in direct visitor spending including labor income. Dominated by Alaska's most iconic landmark, the tallest mountain in North America, Denali National Park is the six-million-acre heart of Interior Alaska. Glacier Bay's natural beauty has made it a star attraction on most cruise line itineraries as ships sail through the Inside Passage. But what really makes this dynamic, glacier-studded, marine wildlife-packed fjord special is its history as the ancestral homeland of the Huna Tlingit clans. Kenai Fjords National Park, and lots more.

Depending on where you travel in Alaska, you might have dozens of opportunities to learn about the state's Indigenous peoples and cultures, whether you visit Saxman Native Village near Ketchikan, hear stories about Glacier Bay from a Huna Tlingit cultural guide or watch artists working on their Umiaks for whaling season at the Iñupiat Heritage Center.

There are 574 federally recognized Indian Nations (variously called tribes, nations, bands, pueblos, communities and native villages) in the United States — 229 of them in Alaska alone — and numerous other tribes recognized by their respective state governments.

Alaska's 11 distinct Native cultures are spread across the state, with Iñupiaq and St. Lawrence Island Yupik peoples living in the Arctic; Athabascans living in Southcentral and Interior Alaska; Yup'ik & Cup'ik, Unanga and Sugpiaq (Alutiiq) Native peoples in Southwest Alaska; and Eyak, Haida, Tsimshian, and Tlingit tribes in Southeast Alaska.

2010 U.S. Census: A Profile of the Asian Population



While the total U.S. population grew by 9.7 percent to 308.7 million in 2010, the Asian population grew more than four times faster than any other racial group. The Asian alone population increased from 10.2 million in 2000 to 14.7 million in 2010, registering a 43 percent growth. Likewise, the Asian alone-or-in-combination population increased by 46 percent as it grew from 11.9 million in 2000 to 17.3 million in 2010.

The Asian population grew in all regions of the U.S. The alone-or-in-combination population grew the fastest in the South, boasting a 69 percent increase. This is followed by a 48 percent growth in the Midwest, a 45 percent growth in the Northeast, and a 36 percent growth in the West. While more Asians alone or in combination reside in the West, their overall proportion declined by three percentage points. Roughly 75 percent of the Asian population lives in ten states: California, New York, Texas, New Jersey, Hawaii, Illinois, Washington, Florida, Virginia, and Pennsylvania. Of these ten, Texas, Florida, Virginia, Pennsylvania, Washington, and New Jersey recorded the highest growth rates. Although the Asian population increased in all fifty states, it still represents less than 2 percent of the total population in West Virginia, Mississippi, Alabama, Kentucky, Arkansas, South Carolina, Tennessee, Louisiana, Montana, Wyoming, Idaho, South Dakota, North Dakota, Maine, and Vermont.

Asian subgroups also experienced growth. The Chinese alone-or-in-combination population is the largest detailed Asian group with a population of four million. While the Bhutanese population remains proportionally smaller than that of other detailed Asian groups, it recorded the fastest growth, increasing from 200 in 2000 to 19,000 in 2010. Asian Indians recorded the largest growth with a 68 percent increase from 2000. Filipinos followed with a 44 percent increase; the Vietnamese, 42 percent; Koreans, 39 percent. The Japanese recorded the slowest growth at 14 percent. Together, the Asian Indians, Chinese, and Filipinos form 60 percent of the Asian alone population.
