Tourism Promotion has become our special project during these uncertain times. Tourism is the world's largest industry. Prior to the pandemic, according to the National Travel and Tourism Week (NTTW) the travel industry was a powerful economic engine, supporting jobs and driving local economies in every pocket of America. The industry had experienced 107 straight months of growth, generated \$2.6 trillion in economic output, supported 17 million American jobs and delivered a \$51 billion trade surplus to the U.S.

It is estimated that more than 2.26 million people visited the State of Alaska during 2019, spending \$2.2 billion, creating 10 per cent of state jobs, generating more than **\$214 million** in state and local tax revenues, and Economic Impact of \$4.5 billion in 2018. Unfortunately, COVID-19 is still hurting Tourism revenues in Alaska significantly.

While Tourism bounced back strongly in 2022, driven by pent-up demand and the lifting of travel restrictions, the international travel remains 54.6% below pre-pandemic. The recovery is fragile with new uncertainties from the economic slowdown & geopolitical instability.

Alaska History & General Information

The history of Alaska dates back to around 14,000 BC. It is believed that the Asiatic groups crossed the Bering land bridge (1580 AD) into what is now western Alaska. The Native Tribes may have been a part of the Xiongnu Empire which inhabited the eastern Asian Steppe, a tribal confederation of fierce warriors who fought on horseback. The Xiongnu dominated a vast part of Central Asia for over 500 years, covering large swaths of present-day Siberia and Mongolia.

They lived peacefully in Alaska until the arrival of the Russians in 1770's and then by the Spanish & British, each one introducing their languages, religions & cultures forcing the natives to surrender and adopt. In addition, they fought for dominance, colonizing & killing hundreds and thousands of the natives. The Europeans also brought diseases for which the natives were not immune to, and which killed thousands more.

On March 30, 1867, Seward and Russian envoy Baron Edouard de Stoeckl signed the Treaty of Cession, which gave the entire Alaskan territory over to the United States for \$7.2 million, or roughly 2 cents an acre.

Life got much better for the Natives after March 30, 1867 when U.S. purchased Alaska from Russia, and with the discovery of Gold in 1896, which brought many other settlers and more than \$1 billion to the economy. In 1957, with the discovery of oil further added a fortune to Alaskan economy. Today, Alaska is one of the richest states in America, with prosperous fishing & tourism industries and an even more prosperous petroleum industry

Alaska is increasingly becoming a multicultural state, attracting thousands of highly skilled professionals from around the world, bringing foreign cultures from Africa, Asia, Europe, the Middle East, Latin America and the Pacific Islands.

From adventure, arts, culture, breathtaking sightseeing to wildlife, tourism in Alaska is the second-largest private sector employer, accounting for one in eight Alaskan jobs, nearly 2 million visitors, and \$2.42 billion in direct visitor spending including labor income. Dominated by Alaska's most iconic landmark, the tallest mountain in North America, Denali National Park is the six-million-acre heart of Interior Alaska. Glacier Bay's natural beauty has made it a star attraction on most cruise line itineraries as ships sail through the Inside Passage. But what really makes this dynamic, glacier-studded, marine wildlife-packed fjord special is its history as the ancestral homeland of the Huna Tlingit clans. Kenai Fjords National Park, and lots more.

Depending on where you travel in Alaska, you might have dozens of opportunities to learn about the state's Indigenous peoples and cultures, whether you visit Saxman Native Village near Ketchikan, hear stories about Glacier Bay from a Huna Tlingit cultural guide or watch artists working on their Umiaqs for whaling season at the Iñupiat Heritage Center.

There are 574 federally recognized Indian Nations (variously called tribes, nations, bands, pueblos, communities and native villages) in the United States — 229 of them in Alaska alone — and numerous other tribes recognized by their respective state governments.

Alaska's 11 distinct Native cultures are spread across the state, with Iñupiaq and St. Lawrence Island Yupik peoples living in the Arctic; Athabascans living in Southcentral and Interior Alaska; Yup'ik & Cup'ik, Unangax and Sugpiaq (Alutiiq) Native peoples in Southwest Alaska; and Eyak, Haida, Tsimshian, and Tlingit tribes in Southeast Alaska.
