**Tourism Promotion** has become our special project during these uncertain times. Tourism is the world's largest industry. Prior to the pandemic, according to the National Travel and Tourism Week (NTTW) the travel industry was a powerful economic engine, supporting jobs and driving local economies in every pocket of America. The industry had experienced 107 straight months of growth, generated \$2.6 trillion in economic output, supported 17 million American jobs and delivered a \$51 billion trade surplus to the U.S.

It is estimated that more than 22.5 million people visited the State of Alabama during 2020, spending \$13.3 billion, creating 165,230 jobs (direct & indirect), and generating more than \$890 million in state and local tax revenues. While Tourism bounced back strongly in 2022, driven by pent-up demand and the lifting of travel restrictions, the international travel remains 54.6% below pre-pandemic. The recovery is fragile with new uncertainties from the economic slowdown & geopolitical instability.

# **Alabama History & General Information**

Alabama has a lot of history, starting as home to indigenous population for thousands of years, including Cherokees, the Alabama, Chickasaw, and several other tribes. The French arrived in 1702, but Alabama was controlled by many European powerhouses before becoming a US state in 1819.

The state has always been at the center of American social issues, from its role as the capital of the Confederacy (1861) during the Civil War to its status as the birthplace of the Civil Rights Movement in the 1960's, with leaders like Rosa Parks, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and many more, who became the flashpoint for the Civil Rights Movement, making Alabama a leader in pursuing equality & freedom, changing America and the world.

Alabama's booming economy of the 1820s and 30s was heavily reliant on the vital cotton industry; with perfect land for the crops, this state was the center for cotton growth, with large plantations across the state relying almost exclusively on slave labor.

With industrialization, good government, hard-working & disciplined citizens and significant foreign investment (\$4.2 billion in 2019), Alabama has become the fifth largest automobile manufacturing state in the nation, as

well as an important center for higher education & bio-technological research, including Air University at the Maxwell-Gunter Air Force Base, located on the site of the Wright Brothers' first civilian flying school. More than 30 of the biggest international manufacturers are now based in Alabama, producing goods from Passenger jets to minivans and exporting to roughly 200 countries every year.

**The culture of Alabama** is intricately tied to African-American heritage and an incredibly rich tradition of music and literature that spans from the country bluegrass of Hank Williams to the iconic American novel *To Kill a Mockingbird*.

The twin establishment of the Equal Justice Initiative (EJI) and the National Memorial for Peace and Justice (*informally known as the National Lynching Memorial*), perched on a hill overlooking downtown Montgomery, were founded by Bryan Stevenson, whose book "Just Mercy" (made into a feature film) depicts his work on behalf of the unjustly imprisoned and other victims of institutional racism. The memorial stuns most visitors, as it features hundreds of steel monolithic monuments to lynching victims across the nation, and calls communities to confront ugly truths rather than sweep them under the rug.

Alabama is increasingly becoming a multicultural state, attracting thousands of highly skilled professionals from around the world, bringing foreign cultures from Africa, Asia, Europe, the Middle East, Latin America and the Pacific Islands. There is also a significant migration of African Americans back to Alabama in recent years, mainly because of its culture, hospitality, friendliness and family oriented atmosphere.
